

# From CA 2 CX for charity

A group of 34 cyclists from as far as the US, Canada, Germany, composed a 607 km mountain bike challenge from Meerendal (Cape Town) to Krayena in aid of the Herberg Children's Home in Robertson.

Arriving in Krayena last week Thursday, after six days of cycling 180 to 190 km each day, the group took part in the 50 km MTB Run at the Krayena Cycle Festival on Saturday.

According to Peter Uren, Marketing Manager, Herberg Children's Home, this was the 8th year the Sport CA2CX MTB Tour took place – including five years as a road tour and the last four years as a mountain bike tour – but only the second year in aid of the Herberg.

He says the group of cyclists this year consisted of various businessmen and women from the Western Cape to Gauteng, "who took off a week from their busy schedules to take part in the tour to raise funds for the children's home."

"The tour started on Saturday at Meerendal, with stops over in Worcester, Montagu, Barrydale, Caledon, George and ending off the tour in Krayena," says Peter.

She says apart from a little mishap with a trailer wheel bursting near Oudtshoorn, there were no major issues and the cyclists all made it safely to Krayena.

"Although the route was tough for many, their motivation was the fact that for each kilometre they cycled, R1 would be donated to the Herberg Children's Home."

"They had to pedal because it is for a good cause," says Peter, who organised the tour.

He says the money raised will be

used to fund the studies of some of the four school learners at the Home, "giving them (the children) the opportunity to study at college or university – something they probably would never have had."

On the second last night of the six day tour, a gala evening was held in George where the cyclists could all put their bikes down and enjoy the company of their fellow cyclists.

Each cyclist – who had to pay R7 000 to cover their own expenses on the tour – was encouraged to contribute to the meal.

Prize items also given to some of the top cyclists included Nan Kleiby (woman riding her 4th mountain bike tour), Stanley Viljoen and Hanse Lourens (best riders nominated in their respective groups – fast and slower cyclists groups) and Ernst Jordaan (the cyclist who collected the most money for the Herberg).

Various wins were also awarded during the evening, adding to the festive element of almost R60 000 that was raised with the Sport CA2CX MTB Tour.

"The best thing of the tour is witnessing how friendships and lead-nous relationships are formed among the cyclists," says Peter.

"After spending so much time together, we are one big family."

• The Herberg Children's Home is situated in Robertson and accommodates 122 children (boys and girls, from ages 0-18 years) from Cape Town and surroundings, to as far as Port Elizabeth.
